Aoife's Only Son is a collection of new songs in Gàidhlig and English inspired by the story 'Bàs Mac Chù Chulainn' from the literary epic *The Tain*. Following **Hammy Sgìth's** Sonic Bites in January, Aoife's Only Son invites you into the world of a wee boy who lived thousands of years ago. Fusing rap and dance music with traditional storytelling, Sgìth has created a playful performance that draws on his experiences of learning Gàidhlig and joining an online community of speakers during lockdown, making music for the craic.

"Aoife's Only Son was inspired by a bronze age story about a young boy who grows up without his dad, and then must fight everyone he meets. The audience can expect genre-hopping beats, witty lyrics and a modern take on old traditions" says Hammy.

"I'm excited to be working with Cryptic. After my first piece with them, Rachamaid, was finished, I bought the computer I made the album on. It feels like completing the story of the music."

Hammy Sgìth (aka Liam McCormick) was born in a flat in Glasgow, hopefully into a bathtub, in 1996. Before his first parents night he asked his mum to tell his teacher that he was done with school and that he was going to leave to become an Art Attackist. He left school at 16 and became a kitchen porter. His solo-work, *The Death of Aoife's Only Son*, was performed at the Tron Theatre in 2019. In 2017, he was cast as Billy in Louie from Hector Bizerk's play, *Inheritance*. He was also part of Radio 1xtra's *Words First* Programme, and he performed his work *Arms in Arms* live to over 3,000 people in the Roundhouse and it was broadcast by the BBC.

Additional television work includes football poems written for the Scottish and League Cup finals, for BBC Scotland and BT Sport respectively. In 2019, McCormick went to college to 'get his life back on track'. "Why Gaelic?" his Career Advisor asked him, pointedly. "Because I have been promised a sense of fulfilment by a lot of things. Food, beer, work, creativity, independence. But none of them work. What works for me is learning new words and using them to make memes with little lines above the letters and sending them into a group chat that is named after farming terminology from the Jacobite era. "S Hamaidh Sgìth a chanas iad ris, agus 's toil leis eachdraidh. Nì e Hip-Hop anns a' ghaidhlig agus faodaidh tu a lorg an ceol aige an-seo."
